Canadian Rockies Public Schools' (CRPS) Right From the Start team continues to bring mental health education to life for all Kindergarten through Gr. 8 students. Presenting to the Board, March 26, 2025, Success Coaches Kat Wiebe, Megan Jenniex and Deren Alward alongside Program Manager Eileen McCabe, shared their approach to helping students build resilience through lessons on empathy, problem-solving, emotion regulation and more. Programs like Second Step, Zones of Regulation and Open Parachute help translate complex ideas into ageappropriate strategies. Each school tailors its approach to reflect its unique community, offering creative initiatives such as Grandpals, the Mental Health T-Shirt Contest and even a free screening of "Inside Out 2." The work doesn't stop when the school year ends. In addition to being present at summer markets, programming over the summer months includes roller skating, outdoor games and CALM mindfulness sessions, helping students stay connected and supported. Mark Your Calendars

The Board of Trustees approved CRPS' 2025/26 Learning Calendar, March 26, 2025, following thorough input from school leaders, staff, and trustees. The year includes 194.5 operational days, 180 instructional days, and designated time for professional learning and teacher preparation. Students will return to class on Aug. 26, with staff beginning on Aug. 21. The winter holiday will begin at 12 noon on Dec. 19 and run through Jan. 2, while spring break is scheduled from March 30 to April 10. Fourteen half-day and five full-day professional learning sessions are built into the year, alongside two and a half days for parent/teacher/student conferences and organizational purposes. To help families plan ahead, draft calendars for the 2026/27 and 2027/28 school years have also been approved in principle. All three calendars will be available shortly on the division website under the "About Us" section, giving parents and staff time to prepare for the years ahead.

find themselves strolling Parisian boulevards as part of an immersive French language and cultural experience planned for spring break 2026. Teachers and administrators are working with EF Educational Tours to build a rich itinerary that brings students face-to-face with the history, art and everyday life of France. The trip is subject to final approval from the Board of Trustees, pending completion of all required documentation and planning procedures. A parent presentation is in the works, and students are preparing to fund raise to help cover the cost of travel. The school aims to offer this experience every second year, giving learners a meaningful extension to their studies and continuing the pathway started by the Lawrence Grassi Middle School Quebec exchange for Gr. 7 and 8 French Immersion students. If approved, learning will leap off the page and into the heart of Paris.

Summer CALM Program

The reputation of the Canadian Rockies Outdoor Learning Centre (OLC) continues to grow, and word of mouth has once again fueled record demand for its **Summer CALM Program**. To meet increasing interest, CRPS added 150 more spots for the summer 2025, and now only a few spots remain open for the week of June 16-20, 2025. This five-day, four-night program immerses students in hands-on learning in Kananaskis Country, combining curriculum outcomes with real-world experiences in wellness, leadership, financial literacy, and communication. Students earn 10 Alberta Education credits through a mix of pre-course assignments and experiential learning, supported by an experienced instructional team. Over the 11 weeks, two courses run each week with 25 students per group, with shared activities that foster community and connection.

A Salute to Service

Canmore Collegiate High School's **Rob VanderLee** was awarded the King Charles III Coronation Medal on Feb. 20 during a formal presentation at Calgary's McDougall House. Presented by Lieutenant Governor **Salma Lakhani**, the honour recognized Rob for his 44 years of leadership in Cadet programs - 38 as a Cadet Instructor Cadre member. Within CRPS, Rob has shaped Remembrance Day ceremonies for nearly three decades, often leading services, coordinating veteran visits, and encouraging student participation in Legion contests. More Time, More Voices

Alberta Education has extended the deadline for its annual assurance survey to March 28, 2025, giving parents additional time to share their feedback. Parents and guardians of students in Grades 4, 7, and 10 who received a mailed survey package but have not yet responded online are encouraged to take a few minutes to contribute. A strong response rate means a stronger foundation for school and system improvement. Each completed survey adds depth to the collective understanding of how students are doing and what supports they need the most.
